

Today, 16 percent of America's children are considered to have overweight or obesity. You know all too well the dangerous health consequences of obesity, but in addition to these concerns, the disease can also cause depression, social stigmatization, poor academic performance, and much more – challenges particularly acute for our children. The childhood obesity demonstration project is the first among many steps the government can take to address childhood obesity.


As Congress considers health care reform, we urge you to consider expanding the identification and treatment of childhood and adult obesity. For instance, BMI and body composition should be screened as standard vital signs in all medical visits for children and adults so that risk for becoming overweight or obese is detected early enough to allow for interventions.

With \$177 billion a year and 83 cents of every health care dollar spent on obesity-related health care, the nation cannot afford to ignore this epidemic. We look forward to working with you to develop policies that enable better identification, management, and treatment of obesity.
